

ELIGIBILITY, ARRIVAL OF AND DISMISSAL OF EXHIBITS

WCF Exhibitor Eligibility

- 1) Exhibitors MUST be a resident of Washington County to enter except for the Open Horse Show, Gymkhana, Ox Challenge, Draft Show, Truck & Tractor Pulls, and the Demolition Derby. YOUTH must be a resident of Washington County, attend a school in Washington County or be a member of a 4-H Club, FFA or Scouts in Washington County. Exceptions for livestock: If the primary farm is located & operated in Washington County but the owner is a non-resident, they will be allowed to exhibit their animals at the fair.
- 2) Minimum age for Exhibitors is 5yrs old by December 1st of the current year.
- 3) Youth are 5 yrs.old as of Dec. 1st of current yr. & under 19 yrs of age as of January 1st of the current year.

ARRIVAL OF NON-ANIMAL FAIR EXHIBITS

ALL EXHIBITORS MUST CHECK IN THEIR ITEMS AT THE PICNIC PAVILLION ON SATURDAY and MONDAY between given Department hours. When you do not check-in your items, the Judge's Book is missing your items. Please follow directions.

ALL NON-ANIMAL YOUTH EXHIBITS are to be brought in on SATURDAY before fair between 9am-3pm. Check-In will take place in the Picnic Pavilion (the old show ring) to prevent congestion in the Youth Building for Face to Face Judging. Entry Tags for Youth Building Items will be available for pickup in the PICNIC PAVILION.

<u>DOMESTIC ARTS OPEN CLASSES</u> including TEXTILES, FINE ARTS, PHOTOGRAPHY, CRAFTS, WOOD ARTS & FURNISHINGS, and CULINARY ARTS will be CHECKED-IN AT THE PICNIC PAVILION on SATURDAY before fair between 9:00 am & 3:00 pm. Entry Tags for these Items will be available for pickup there.

<u>OPEN FARM TOY</u> entries may arrive Saturday 9 am - 3 pm, Sunday 11 am - 3 pm. The Farm Toy Building is open Monday prior to Fair at 9 am and exhibitors will have until 9:45 am to set up display. Judging will begin at 10 am

<u>OPEN FLOWERS & GREENS, OPEN FARM PRODUCE</u>: are to be brought in to the Handmade & Homegrown Building **MONDAY, opening day of Fair.** Entry Tags for these Items will be available for pickup outside their building.

OPEN PRODUCE to be brought in between 9:00am—2:00pm. **OPEN FLOWERS & GREENS** to be brought in between 9:00am—2:00pm

OPEN & YOUTH WOOL & FIBER entries are to be brought in Saturday prior to opening of the Fair between 9:00 am and 3:00 pm or MONDAY of Fair by 11:00 am. Judging will begin at 12 noon. Youth are to be present for Face-to-Face JUDGING. EXHIBITORS are to Check-In entries at the Picnic Pavillion and then proceed to the County Bounty Building for JUDGING & DISPLAY (Youth entries will then be taken to the YOUTH BUILDING for exhibition.

- REMINDER: ALL ANIMALS ARE TO BE IN PLACE BY 5 PM MONDAY.
- MUST FOLLOW THE TRAFFIC PATTERN PROVIDED ON PAGE 28 IN THIS HANDBOOK!
- NOTE: ALL TRUCK DRIVERS OR EXHIBITORS/EXHIBITOR REPRESENTATIVES MUST HAVE ALL OF THE REQUIRED PAPERWORK AT THE TIME OF VET CHECK:
 - 1) ALL Registration Papers &
 - 2) ALL Health Papers FOR THE ANIMALS ON THE TRUCK.
- IT WOULD ALSO BE BEST TO HAVE THE EXHIBITORS/EXHIBITOR REPRESENTATIVES PRESENT TO ASSIST IN IDENTIFY ANIMALS & UNLOADING.

Vet Check DAYS & TIMES Plan Accordingly

HORSES STAYING ON THE GROUNDS FOR THE WEEK:

- ARRIVALS WILL TAKE PLACE on SUNDAY starting at 4:00 pm and ending at 7:00 pm and on MONDAY starting at 9:00 am and ending at 11:00 am.
- Horse trailers will enter the Horse Events Parking Lot and line up in one single straight line.
- Coggins Papers/Digital (on phone) will be checked and dates recorded as well as Rabies
 Vaccination (which must be done at least 14 days prior to the opening day of the Fair) by Fair
 Appointed Attendants. If the Coggins or the Rabies Vaccination Does not meet the
 Washington County Fair & NY State Ag & Markets requirements that horse will be sent home
 and not be allowed to stay on the grounds or show.
- Horses will also be evaluated by an Equine Veterinarian for a Body Condition Score. The
 Washington County Fair is requiring that horses staying on the grounds for the week MUST
 meet a MINIMUM Body Condition Score. If the minimum score is not met, the horse will be
 sent home and not be allowed to stay in the tent for the week. However, the exhibitor will
 still be able to truck in that horse for the day of the shows they have entered.
- If more needs to be dropped off at the horse tent, trucks may drive up to the tent. All Horse traffic should EXIT through the Horse Events Parking Area or Gate C.

Fair Hours

The Fair officially opens @5:00pm, Monday, August 19th. The gates will be manned all day Monday & admission will be charged to those not directly involved in the set up of exhibits & concessions.

Monday 5:00 pm - 12:00 midnight

Tuesday - Saturday 9:00 am - 12:00 midnight

Sunday 9:00 am - 9:00 pm

Dismissal of Exhibits

*Displays MUST REMAIN INTACT until 9:30pm on Sunday. This includes signs, ribbons, and animals, etc. Sunday Evening Exhibit Removal Schedule:

9:00 pm - Buildings will close & vendors can begin break-down.

9:30pm - Exhibitors can begin to collect exhibits. Animals can be <u>walked</u> off to trailers in staging area which is the horse trailer parking area.

9:30pm - 11:00pm - Buildings will be open for exhibit removal. Building Superintendents will post how late each building will be open.

10:00 pm - Gates will open for vehicle traffic.

NOTE: All displays, exhibits and animals, must remain in place in their appropriate exhibit building, their show rings, wash areas, milking parlor, or taking part in their respective event or activity until the close of Fair. EXCEPTIONS: those being exhibited at NY State Fair, yearling and aged rams, and those approved by the NYS Veterinarian for health concerns. Forfeiture of premiums and future exhibitions may result from violating this rule.

NO dual ownership or syndicates are allowed for YOUTH exhibitors. Ownership of all OPEN CLASS livestock is to be by July 15th. The Transfer Date will be used to determine ownership, not the issue date on the Registration Paper.

Entry Fees	Fees for Open Classes vary. Use the Exhibitors Handbook to identify entry fees. No Fee for YOUTH CLASSES Entry Fees must accompany entry forms. Make check/money order payable to: Washington County Fair, Inc. If a check is returned, the exhibitor will be charged the bank fee. There will be no refund of entry fees.
Entry DeadLines	Last Day for Entries to be Postmarked is Wed. July 17th. Last day for Entries to be Hand Delivered to the Entry Office at the Fairgrounds is Friday July 19th by 6:00pm. Last day for entries to be SUBMITTED On-Line is by midnight Monday JULY 22nd. Make sure you get 2 confirmations: (1) confirming you are registered as an exhibitor and (2) that your entries have been submitted (approved/rejected). You must also submit payment required at time of submission (if required)otherwise your entries will not go through as completed. If you are only entering Youth Entries, there is no entry fee; however, you must continue through the process online and hit the SUBMIT button prior to the midnight deadline of JULY 22nd.

Fair Entry Entry Procedures for On-Line Entries

PLEASE NOTE: FAIRENTRY DOES NOT SAVE THE EMAIL AND PASSWORD FROM PREVIOUS YEARS.

EACH YEAR IS NEW AND YOU MUST "CREATE AN ACCOUNT" AT FIRST.

Family Entry or Individual Entry

- 1. You will need a valid email account and a credit or debit card to complete the process & submit your entries.
- 2. Be sure to complete your entries (including the final "Submit" step) PRIOR to the deadline of midnight July 29th.
- 3. Go to <u>www.washingtoncountyfair.com</u> which will take you to our website. From there you will go to "Exhibit/Compete". Before entering any department, you are responsible for reading through the Department's Rules and Regulations and Health Requirements aas per NY State Ag. & Markets Rules and Regulations (for livestock). You may download these from the website. You will then click "Enter Online" which will take you to the FairEntry program.
 - (http://www.fairentry.com and you will click Find your Fair -make sure it is Washington County NY look for our Logo)
- 4. First Time Going into the FAIRENTRY Click on the link to "Create a FairEntry Account". (After that, if you are logging back in, enter your valid email & password that you created and click the Sign in link. DO NOT SET UP ANOTHER ACCOUNT.
 - Enter your email twice and click "Create Account". This must be a valid email address so that you can receive the necessary confirmation messages.
 - On the Account Creation page, the information fields that are required are Account Name, Phone, Password, and email. Click "Create Account".
- 5. Then you will Click "Begin Registration".
- 6. Our Program is configured to accept Individual Entries. You will see "Exhibitors" highlighted in Green. Click on "Individual". (once you have entered one individual and you have other individuals to enter you may do so once the first one is done...)
- 7. Enter the information on the Contact Info Screen (no need to enter the cell phone carrier).
 - Click "Continue" when you are finished entering the data.
 - Enter your mailing address (filling in all required fields). The address entered here will be used for mailing premium checks. **Click "Continue"** when all information is entered correctly.
- 8. Review your exhibitor information. If any information is incorrect, Click the green "Edit" button in the appropriate group to change it. When all the information is correct, **Click "Continue to Entries".**

Creating Entries

Each exhibitor can have multiple entries. One entry must be made for each item, animal, class, etc. For example, if an exhibitor is bringing 2 photos, two entries in the Photography Section must be created. If an exhibitor is showing one horse in 5 events, five class entries must be created. Once all entries have been created for the first exhibitor, you have the choice of creating another exhibitor in this family (and entries) or proceeding to check out (submitting the entries, whether or not fees are charged).

- 1. The **Entries button on top is now green**. **Click "Add an Entry"** beside the correct Exhibitor (if there is more than one exhibitor listed).
- 2. **Click "Select"** beside the department that you wish to enter.
 - After you have selected a Department, you will see a list of Sections to select from, and then a list of available classes. (notice that there are blue "Change" links in case you mistakenly select an incorrect department, section, or class.)
 - After you have selected the class, **Click the green "Continue"** button.
- 3. If this is an animal class entry, you will be required to specify which animal will be exhibited in this class.
 - You will see the option "Add an Animal", Fill in all of the fields with information about the animal you intend to exhibit.
 - Click "Create and Add Animal" when finished.
 - If the information was entered incorrectly, you have the option to either "Remove From Entry" or "Edit Animal Details". When it's correct, Click "Continue".
- 4. Any questions or file uploads related to the entry of this class will be next. **Click "Continue"** after answering those questions or uploading documents.

- 5. The Review Screen allows you to double-check this entry for accuracy, and make any changes necessary. When the information is correct, **Click "Continue"** and that class entry is complete.
- 6. When each class entry is complete, you have 3 choices for what to do next:
 - a) If all class entries have been completed for one exhibitor, you can then Register another Exhibitor in this family.
 - b) If this exhibitor has more class entries to make, you can Click "Add another Entry for this Exhibitor".
 - c) If all entries for all exhibitors in the family have been completed, **Click "Continue to Payment"** to finalize and submit your entries.
- 7. Review your entries for completeness and accuracy. **Notice the Summary and Detail buttons at the top of the list on the right.** If there are errors, Click the green "Entries" section at the top of the page. Click "Continue" when all the information is correct. At this point you can PRINT the copy of your entries.
- 8. Read through the Payment Instructions and select your method of payment (only credit/debit card). Note: Even if you owe no money (no fees are charged) you MUST CLICK "CONTINUE" to the last 'CONFIRM" step to SUBMIT YOUR ENTRIES.
- 9. Read the information in the "After you Submit" section. You may have to check a box to "Agree to Terms". Click "SUBMIT" to finalize the entries for the exhibitors in this family. After you Click "SUBMIT", no changes are possible to these entries until the Entry Office approves or rejects the entries. You will receive an email stating whether the Entries were approved or rejected. If something is rejected there will be a brief explanation as to what was rejected and why. You will then have the opportunity to correct the entry that was rejected if needed and resubmit it.
 ONCE YOU HAVE CREATED YOUR ENTRIES AND SUBMITTED THEM AND THEY HAVE BEEN APPROVED, YOU WILL BE ABLE TO GO BACK IN AT ANY TIME USING YOUR EMAIL AND THE PASSWORD YOU CREATED ANY TIME BEFORE MIDNIGHT JULY 29th...

WASHINGTON COUNTY FAIR CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

As adapted from the National Code of Show Ring Ethics of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions (IAFE)

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards, and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from the future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

- 1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership, and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
- 2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
- 3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
- 4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of drugs. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event, which culminates with the animal entering the food chain, shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state, and provincial statutes, regulations, and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state, and provincial statutes, regulations, and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event. If the laboratory report on the chemical analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample is taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested (by the approved laboratory to which it is sent) is the one taken from the animal in question. Its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise at any hearing in regard to the matter conducted by the fair or livestock show. At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.
- 5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
- 6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
- 7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair, or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation, and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
- 8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individuals to disciplinary action.
- 9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
- 10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have any disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show against such individuals published in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notices to members.
- 11. The act of entering an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

Consequence: Forfeiture of premiums and future exhibitions may result from violating these rules.

ENTRY TAGS AND PASS INFORMATION

Entry Tags & Reports

Exhibitors in the Youth Building, Grange, Homemade/Homegrown (H & H) Building and Farm Toy Show will pick up their entry tags & reports at the Picnic Pavilion Saturday or Monday. All Livestock Exhibitors will pick their tags and reports in the Entry Office.

Entry Office Hours are as follows:

Saturday before Fair: 9 am—4 pm Sunday before Fair: 9 am—7 pm Monday of Fair: 9 am—7 pm Fair Week: 8 am—5 pm

EXHIBITOR PASS POLICY

All animal exhibitors will be able to pick up their entry packet (which will contain their Entry Lists,day passes and vehicle hang tags, etc) in the Entry Office Saturday prior to Fair through Monday of Fair by 5:00pm. All Open Exhibitors that have paid their entry fees and have checked in their animals and item exhibits may purchase discounted Day Passes until 5:00 pm Tuesday evening in the Entry Office. These passes are available in packs of seven (7) DAY PASSES for the discounted rate of \$22.50/pack. Open Exhibitors will be able to purchase a maximum of 4 packs of seven (7) DAY PASSES at the discounted price in the Entry Office. Exhibitor car tags will be limited to two(2) per exhibit/farm/family. These do not guarantee a parking place as space is limited. (7 day passes are the equivalent of 1 week pass)

Any exchange of DAY PASSES for WEEK PASSES must be done at pick up of Exhibitor Packet. (Sat-Mon) There will be NO exchange of a WEEK PASS for seven (7) DAY PASSES after 5:00 pm Monday (opening day of fair).

OPEN DEPT. PASS POLICY:

Large Animal Exhibitors (Cattle, Horses, Draft Animals, Sheep, Goats, & Swine) will receive passes based on the number of animals checked in.

CATTLE & DRAFT ANIMALS:

1—3 animals = 14 day passes

4-7 animals = 21 day passes;

8 or more animals = 28 day passes.

SHEEP, GOATS, & SWINE:

1—5 animals = 14 day passes

6 or more animals = 21 day passes

HORSE: coming for day of Open Shows

1 Day Pass for the rider

Small Animal Exhibitors: POULTRY

No minimum number of animals—4 day passes

(If volunteering for feeding/care, see Supt. For additional passes)

DOMESTIC ARTS, FLOWERS GREENS & OPEN PRODUCE: Exhibitors will receive passes based on the number of items

checked in by the Entry Person or Superintendent.

1-10 items = 2 Day passes

11-20 items = 4 Day passes

20 items or more = 6 day passes.

FARM TOY SHOW, GRANGE & RELIGION exhibitors will receive 2 day passes.

(Multiple OPEN department entries are **NOT ACCUMULATED** (Ex. Open Sheep entries of 4 animals & a domestic art entry will receive 14 day passes - based on the Open Sheep entries only)

YOUTH DEPT. PASS POLICY:

Large Animal Exhibitors (Cattle, Sheep, Goat, Swine, & Horse-staying on the grounds)

- There is NO minimum number of animals.
- Fourteen (14) day passes will be given to a parent/guardian (equivalent of 2 week passes) of Youth Exhibitors under 14 years of age. Any Youth 14 years of age or older will receive an additional 7 day passes (equivalent of 1 week pass) which should be turned in to the Entry Office for a wristband if they are staying on the fairgrounds (Monday, opening Day).

Small Animal Exhibitors (Poultry & Rabbits)

- NO minimum number of animals.
- 4 day passes (one for each day of show)
- (If volunteering for feeding/care, see Supt. For additional passes)

For any YOUTH 14 yrs.old or older, staying on the grounds, 7 day passes should be traded in for a wristband at the Entry Office.

(Multiple YOUTH department entries are **NOT ACCUMULATED** (Ex. If a youth exhibitor under 14 yrs. Of age will and has brought 3 Beef Cattle and 2 Rabbits, they will receive 14 day passes based on the Beef Cattle.)

Camper Information & Rules

Camper Application & Payment are DUE WITH ENTRIES BY JULY 22, 2024

- ♦ Camper application must be completed in full with proper information and mailed in or hand-delivered with the appropriate fee by the deadline of JULY 22, 2024. Camping is on a first-come, first-serve basis. We have limited camping spaces.
 - Camping cost is \$100.00 per spot.
- ♦ Campers in the New Camper Area are allowed one car parked next to their camper. They must be 5 feet from any structure and/or awning.
- ♦ EZ Up Tents are allowed by the barns but no sides are allowed
- ♦ Air Conditioners are allowed to be used in designated spots only. No Air Conditioners by Barns
- ♦ Awnings are allowed to be used by Animal Barns Only
- ♦ New York State Department of Health Regulations are:
 - -All campers must have a working fire extinguisher
 - -No Open Awnings
 - -No open fires or barbeque grills.
 - -No dumping of wastewater or greywater on the ground.
- ◆ If you fill your freshwater tank, the hose must be disconnected from the faucet & camper & stored away.
- ♦ Camper permits must be displayed on the camper. Permits should be attached on the latch side of the doorway outside the camper. The permit must be visible at all times.
- ♦ All persons staying in the camper regardless of age must be listed on this form and receive a wristband from the Fair Office.
- ♦ Anyone who is not listed on a camper application and found to be staying will be immediately asked to leave the fairgrounds.
- ♦ Tank pump-outs will be available during the early morning of Tuesday— Sunday. Pump Out Fees will be charged. Pump Outs must be signed up for the day prior to the day of service (Monday Saturday).
- ♦ All Campers must use OUTDOOR Lead cords of #12—3 size or bigger. The use of frayed, taped, or otherwise unsafe cords are prohibited.
- ♦ Campers will be placed at the discretion of the Camper Committee
- ♦ Campers may be brought to the Fairgrounds after 1:00 pm the Friday before the Fair.
- ♦ The Camper Committee will place all Campers during the hours of Friday 1:00-8:00 pm, Saturday 9:00 am 6:00 pm, and Sunday 10:00 am 6:00 pm.
- ♦ All Campers must be placed by Sunday at 6:00 pm.
- ♦ All violations and fines by NYS Dept. of Health will be the responsibility of the signer of the permit.
- ♦ Washington County Fair, Inc. is not liable or responsible for theft or damage to the camper or its contents by fire, the elements, or in any other manner whatsoever.
- ♦ All campers must be removed from the Fairgrounds within five days of the Fair's last day; otherwise, you will be charged a fee of \$25 per day.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Parking/Vehicles

- ♦ Vehicles, including stock trailers & large trucks must be parked in assigned areas outside of EXHIBITOR PARKING by Monday 11:59 pm. These areas will be marked.
- ♦ The Fair shall not be liable under any circumstances, whether of negligence of itself, its agents or otherwise, for any personal injury or for any loss or injury to property.
- ♦ There is no parking around fairground buildings. Violation of this rule may result in the loss of awards from exhibits connected to the vehicle, whether owned by the exhibitor or not.
- ♦ Violators may be towed at the owner's expense.
- ♦ There will be NO moving vehicles on the Fairgrounds from 10:00am to 10:30 pm on Tuesday through Saturday and Sunday from 10:00am to 10:00pm with the exception of emergency vehicles & trash removal equipment.
- ◆ Exhibitor Car Tags will be limited to two (2) per exhibit. These tags do NOT guarantee a parking place as space is limited.
- ♦ If feed/supplies need to be brought to your animals during the week, there will be transportation available at Inner Gate C.
- ♦ Follow weekend (prior to Fair) traffic patterns indicated on the FAIRGROUND MAP on the inside of cover of the Exhibitors Handbook.

ATV/Golf Carts

- ♦ Operation of ATV's/Golf Carts on the grounds will be by authorized personnel only & only for Fair business.
- ♦ All ATVs & Golf Carts must be registered at the Fair Office. **Permit plates will be issued at that time.** A valid driver's license & proof of insurance will be required for ALL operators.
- ♦ Staff, Directors, Superintendents, Vendors, & Public Safety are the only ones allowed to have motorized vehicles. Any vehicles not belonging to the Fair must be registered at the Fair Offiece before being used on the grounds & at the discretion of the Safety Committee.
- ♦ Exhibitors are not allowed to have ATV's, Golf Carts, or other Non-Handicapped motorized vehicles.

PETS

- ♦ No pets are allowed.
- **♦ EXCEPTIONS:**
 - 1) Any pets associated with the carnival or concessionaires should be kept out of sight during fair hours and should be walked discreetly. They are to be confined or on a leash and under control at all times (including in the parking lot). They also must have a current rabies certificate with them.
 - 2) Animals entered for exhibition and/or competition. These animals must stay in their designated exhibitor areas.
 - 3) Animals used in law enforcement must stay in their designated area or on a leash.
 - 4) Owners/trainers, etc. of all of the above are responsible for cleaning up after their animals, including the parking lot.
 - 5) All of the above should have a current rabies certificate available upon request.
 - 6) SERVICE DOGS ARE NOT PETS. Please refer to service animal policy (available in the Fair Office).

Music & Recreational Activities

- ◆ Radios, etc. must not cause annoyance or inconvenience to other exhibitors or fair patrons.
- Unauthorized recreational activities such as balls, frisbees, skateboards, riding toys, scooters, etc. are prohibited on the Fairgrounds during the week of Fair for the safety of our patrons.

Health Requirements & Health Check Process for Animal Exhibitors at the Fair

- ♦ Check the Health Requirements section for types of vaccines, identifications, exams, etc. that are required for your animals.
- ♦ All Animal Exhibitors are required to have their <u>original health papers & registration papers</u> available throughout the time that animals are on the Fairgrounds as they may be asked for by the superintendent, judge, or fair officials.
- ♦ NY State Veterinarians & assistants will check animals for proper identification such as tattoos, scrapie tags, ear tags, etc., as required for each species, to match with the health papers.
- ♦ NY State Veterinarians & assistants will, with the assistance of the exhibitors, inspect animals for signs of disease. Animals deemed unhealthy will be sent home. Times for health checks will be available from your barn superintendents.
- ♦ Please refer to the Contagious Diseases section for policy on sick animals during fair week.

GENERAL RULES & REGULATIONS

The following rules & regulations are made a part of the conditions under which all the entries are accepted and exhibit space or concession privileges are granted.

- ⇒ The rules of the Washington County Fair, Inc. meet the Standards for the Conduct of Fairs as set forth by the State of New York Dept. Of Agriculture & Markets. If the rules of this Fair exceed the State regulations, the rules of this Fair will apply.
- ⇒ The Washington County Fair management reserves the final & absolute right to interpret these rules & regulations & arbitrarily settle & determine matters, questions, & difference in regard to, or otherwise arising out of, connected with or incident to the Fair.
- ⇒ The management reserves the right to amend/add to these rules & regulations as its judgment may be deemed.
- ⇒ Any person who violates any of the following rules & regulations or any special rules & regulations shall forfeit all privileges & awards and be subject to such penalty as the management may order.
- ⇒ The management encourages the reporting of mistreatment or extortion by concessionaires & any discourtesy or irregularity of its employees. Violations of local, state, or federal laws should be reported promptly.
- ⇒ Any form of harassment will not be tolerated on Fair property at any time. Reports of such behavior are to be made in writing & submitted to the Fair Office. Such reports will be kept confidential, will be investigated, & kept on file at the Fair Office. If further action is needed it will be referred to the Executive Committee.

Protests & Complaints

- ⇒ All protests, complaints or grievances must be in writing, plainly stating the situation and must be delivered to the Fair Office within six hours after the incident. **All protests & complaints must be signed.** Picketing will not be allowed on the Fair property. Protestors may be escorted off the grounds.
- ⇒ All protests concerning **judging** must be in writing and signed and must state plainly the complaint. These must be delivered to the Fair Manager within 6 hours after the cause of the complaint/protest.
- ⇒ Problems or concerns pertaining to the **barns** must be put in writing and signed and must state plainly the problem/concern. These must be given to the Superintendents of the respective barns ASAP.

Sales & Solicitation

There shall be no sale of goods or solicitation of funds for any purpose on lands owned by the Washington County Fair, Inc. which lands are commonly known as the Washington County Fairgrounds, at any time during Fair week except in connection with sales or solicitation arising from commercial space rented by the Washington County Fair, Inc. Any such sales or solicitations shall be confined to the actual area agreed upon when the rental agreement is entered into. Raffles/Donation containers are NOT permitted on the premises.

Absolutely no animals may be given away, sold, bartered, or traded in any area of the fairgrounds. **The Exception: The Livestock auction sponsored by the Fair.**

RESOLVED that during Fair week in each year, alcoholic beverages shall be banned from the Fairgrounds (exception is for beer & wine tastings following NYS regulations). The Management of the Fairgrounds and their duly designated agents are hereby authorized to take any and all appropriate action to carry out the intent of this resolution and they are specifically authorized, in their discretion, to bar any persons from the Fairgrounds who are found to be in violation of this resolution. **NOTICE: For all competitive events, a Breathalyzer test may be used at the Management's discretion to ban intoxicated participants.**

Liability

Every possible protection & courtesy will be extended to exhibitors at the Washington County Fair, but the Board shall not be responsible for any loss of exhibits, animals, or equipment from fire, theft, or loss from any other cause; and the Fair will not assume any liability for personal injury sustained either by exhibitors, helpers, visitors, or guests. The Fair will use diligence to insure the safety of articles entered for exhibition, after their arrival & placement, but under no circumstances will it be responsible for any loss, injury or damage done to, or occasioned by, or arising from, any article on exhibition shall indemnify the Fair & Management thereof, against all legal or other proceedings in regard thereto.

Care of Livestock:

ATTENDANTS MUST BE WITH LIVESTOCK AT ALL TIMES.

To properly promote agriculture and educate the public on animal welfare, it is essential that all exhibitors provide proper sustenance, food & drink, at least every 12 hours to all animals housed on the Fairgrounds.

Further, pursuant to NYS Agriculture & Markets Law, Article 26, Section353, states "A person who deprives any animal of necessary sustenance, food or drink, or neglect to furnish it sustenance or drink or unjustifiable injured, maimed, mutilated or killed, or to be deprived of necessary food, or drink, or willfully sets afoot, instigates, engages in, or in any way furthers any act of cruelty, is guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable by imprisonment for not more than one (1) year, or by a fine of not more than one(1) thousand dollars or by both." Additionally, Section 373 states "Any such police officer or agent may also lawfully take possession of any animal in or upon any premises other than a street, road, or public place, which for more than twelve(12) successive hours has been confined or kept in a crowded or unhealthy condition or in unhealthy or unsanitary surroundings or not properly cared for or without necessary sustenance, food or drink, provided that a complaint stating just & reasonable grounds is made under oath or affirmation to any magistrate authorized to issue warrants in criminal cases, and that such warrant authorizing entry & search is issued & delivered by such magistrate; if just & reasonable cause is shown, the magistrate shall immediately issue such warrant.

It is the responsibility of each exhibitor to properly feed & water their animals, at a minimum, once every 12 hours. Failure to do so may result in the removal of the exhibit and the appropriate authorities may be sought for assistance. As the above law indicates, this may result in the seizure of your animals and possible imprisonment.

Display of Exhibits & Animals

Exhibitors must show their exhibits whenever and in such a manner as required by the superintendent in charge of the department. All displays, exhibits and animals, must remain in place in their appropriate exhibit building, their show rings, wash areas, milking parlor, or taking part in their respective event or activity until the close of Fair. Livestock & Exhibits may not leave their building or barn until 9:30pm. EXCEPTIONS: those being exhibited at NY State Fair, yearling and aged rams, and those approved by the NYS Veterinarian for health concerns. Forfeiture of premiums and future exhibitions may result from violating this rule. IAFE Code of Ethics will be followed. Abuser's may be denied exhibiting in the future. All exhibits not called for by 6:00pm Monday, AFTER FAIR, are left at the owner's risk and, unless otherwise arranged for, shall be forfeited to the Fair, which may dispose of them as it wishes. The Fair Management reserves the right to change the hour of release if conditions warrant.

NO livestock are to be on the midway, near food concessions, or in any public area not designated for animals. Public Health & Biosecurity concerns prohibit animals from being taken around the Fairgrounds.

Space & Forage for Animals

Space for Livestock will be provided without charge for exhibition stock from Monday, Opening Day until the close of the Fair.

NO Feed or Bedding of any description will be furnished for Animals.

EXCEPTIONS: Poultry and Rabbit Barns and the FFA Barn which will receive feed & bedding.

Judging

As far as possible, the single judge system will rule & great care will be taken to select only those who are qualified.

- ◆ Judges will receive their books from the Entry Secretary & when judging is complete, the books are to be properly signed by the judges in every case. Books are to be immediately returned to the Entry Secretary at the end of show.
- ♦ Judging will occur in departments as listed.
- ◆ No person or persons will be allowed to interfere with the judges in the discharge of their duties.
- Persons wishing to explain in regard to their exhibits can do so through a Superintendent of the Department. Violation of this rule will automatically disqualify the violator's exhibits in that department.
- ◆ NO consideration will be given by the Judge to any article to which the entry tag is not attached.
- ♦ Any exhibitor or person acting for an exhibitor found looking through the entry books of the exhibits will forfeit all awards or premiums.
- ♦ NO additions to or changes in the Judge's Record shall be made by any person except the Entry Clerk/Secretary in the Entry Secretary's office.

- ♦ The decision of the Judges shall be final in all cases, except where mistakes, frauds, or misrepresentations are shown. In such cases the directors, or such referees that the directors may select, shall decide.
- ♦ All protests must be in writing, plainly stating the reason for the protest and delivered to the Fair Office within 6 hours of the incident. All protests must be signed.
- ★ Competition is defined as a contest for supremacy between two or more products or articles or animals owned by separate exhibitors. Exhibitors having no competition in a class or section will be awarded but one award (the first or second award as the judges think deserved unless otherwise noted under Special Department Rules), and all award shall be given subject to the action of the Board of Directors.

Payment of Awards

The Washington County Fair will mail award checks to the winners of the various classes as shown by the judge's records. Exhibitors desiring their award money paid to agents or employees must furnish the same with written order of Power of Attorney to this effect. No more than two (2) awards will be paid in any Open class per exhibitor. In paying awards, only the judge's books properly signed by judges shall be recognized. Ribbons that may be attached to exhibits are not considered proof of awards as ribbons may become changed. Should stormy weather, unavoidable occurrence or drastic reduction in state funds interpose at any fair to reduce the net receipts below the requirements for awards, the Fair reserves the right to pay awards on a prorated basis after all expenses are paid.

STATE OF NEW YORK DEPT. OF AGRICULTURE & MARKETS

Part 350—Standards for the Conduct of Fairs

- **SECTION 350.1: Fair Sponsor definition.** For purposes of this part, a **Fair Sponsor** shall mean any organization that receives money from the State for the promotion of agriculture and domestic arts pursuant to Article 24 of the Agriculture & Markets Law.
- **SECTION 350.2:** No fee for 4-H, FFA, Junior Fair or School Dept. Exhibits. No entry fee shall be charged for 4 -H Club, FFA, Junior Fair exhibits entered for competition in their own classes, or for entries in the school department.
- **SECTION 350.3**: **Prompt full payment of Awards.** All awards advertised & awarded must be paid promptly and in full, without deduction in the guise of donations or otherwise, notwithstanding any statement to the contrary or in modification thereof announced or stated in the exhibitor book
- **SECTION 350.4: No award for unworthy exhibit.** No award should be given by any judge or paid by any fair sponsor for an unworthy exhibit.
- **SECTION 350.5:** Award amount to attract well-balanced exhibits. The amount of award offered in the various departments should be such as to secure well-balanced exhibits, in the light of the types of agriculture carried on in the territory served by the fair.
- **SECTION 350.6:** No exhibits by judges in departments they oversee. No judges shall be permitted to enter exhibits in competition for award in the department with which they are connected.
- **SECTION 350.7**: **Exhibits are to be plainly labeled.** All exhibits must be plainly labeled so that the full significance of the exhibits will be made clear.
- **SECTION 350.8: Re-exhibition in domestic department.** No articles shall be permitted to be exhibited in the domestic department if it has been previously exhibited therein, unless by official action of the Board of Directors of the Fair Sponsor.
- SECTION 350.9: Ownership of exhibits in Fairs & Shows.
 - (a) All exhibits shall be entered in the name of the exhibit owner provided, however, that any animal exhibit entered in a youth fair, youth exhibition, or 4-H show or exhibition may be entered in the name of the exhibitor. (b) Exhibits shall have been owned by the exhibitor for a period of at least thirty (30) days prior to entry of the exhibit provided, however, that any animal exhibit entered in a youth fair, youth exhibition or 4-H show or exhibition shall have been in the care of the exhibitor for a period of at least sixty (60) days prior to the entry of the exhibit. (c) Proof of ownership of any exhibit shall be provided by the exhibitor, upon request, to the fair sponsor. (d) The Fair Sponsor may limit the number of breeds shown by any exhibitor.

Refusal of an Exhibit. Any Fair Sponsor shall reserve the right to reject or refuse and to order the removal of any exhibit

which, in the opinion of its Board of Directors, is not eligible or worthy of showing or has not met the livestock health requirements set forth in Part 351 of this Title.

SECTION 350.11: Compliance with and Enforcement of Livestock Health Requirements. Each Fair Sponsor shall comply with and enforce the livestock health requirements set forth in Part 351 of this Title.

Exhibitor Pre-fair Guidelines

Cattle, Sheep, Goats, Swine, Llamas, and Alpacas, Cervids, Misc. Ruminants

- Review the animal health requirements booklet including information for your species **before** your veterinarian arrives to inspect your animals. If you have any questions, **ask**.
- Your veterinarian is responsible for inspecting your animals and completing the certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI). Call early to avoid the last-minute rush when mistakes are made and there is no time to correct.
- Make sure USDA approved official ear tags are present on cattle and swine and USDA approved scrapie ID is in place on sheep and goats. Official ID must be applied to animals prior to regulatory testing and completion of the CVI.
- Llamas and alpacas require a microchip or ear tag. If a microchip is utilized make sure the veterinarian confirms the microchip ID or places one. If your animal is identified by a microchip, make sure you bring a working reader with you to the fair.
- ALL IDENTIFICATION MUST BE RECORDED. Make sure it is.
- Review the CVI carefully upon receipt to make sure all the information is correct including any required test or vaccination information.
- **DO NOT** stuff it in an envelope and assume all is well. The time to correct is before pulling them out at the fair. The CVI is your document, and you share responsibility if it is incorrect.
- If you are **importing** livestock from out of state, make sure the interstate requirements are met and you have a valid **interstate certificate of veterinary inspection.**

Poultry

- If your flock is participating in the NPIP program, schedule pullorum flock inspection and testing well ahead of the fair.
- If you're having your birds tested within 90 days of the fair, you must go to a pullorum clinic. Available clinics are listed on the Dept. website. No individual testing is available if you miss a clinic.
- Birds qualified by 90-day test must be identified by official leg band.
- **Bring documentation** with you to the fair in the form of a 1) current NPIP certificate, 2) 90-day test chart or 3) purchase receipt with NPIP certification within 1 year of the date of admission to the fair.

Horses

- **NY origin** horses must be accompanied by a negative EIA test report. The date of sample collection for the qualifying EIA test must have been *on or after January 1, 2023.*
- Imported horses (out of state origin) must be accompanied by an interstate certificate of veterinary inspection with a negative EIA test within 12 months prior to entry. Rabies vaccination information can be incorporated into the CVI.
- Drawing or photograph **must** match the horse.
- Rabies vaccination must be within 1 year of arrival at the fair and be documented by a signed rabies certificate or a signed statement on the EIA test chart with the required information (see requirements).

MOST IMPORTANT

When you are loading your livestock for the trip to the fair, take the time to examine them. Make sure they are the same animals that are on the paperwork and official ID is present and legible. If they are showing any signs of illness, **LEAVE THEM HOME.**

General Prohibitions and Requirements

- No person shall bring or have present an animal on the fairgrounds for any reason (show, exhibit, raffle, demonstration, display) during a fair which is not qualified under NYS regulations.
- Any animal which is subject to inspection upon entry to the fairgrounds will be inspected without covering (wraps, coats, head gear, etc.).
- No person shall present an interstate or intrastate certificate of veterinary inspection that has been altered by anyone other than the issuing veterinarian.
- Animals demonstrating clinical signs or other evidence of infectious, contagious, or communicable diseases shall not be allowed on the fairgrounds during a fair.
- Representatives of the Commissioner may deny admission to, or require removal from, the fair premises or require the segregation of any animal showing signs of, or exposed to, any infectious, contagious, or communicable disease.

NOTE: The fair board of directors has the authority to reject unworthy or unsightly exhibits for reasons other than infectious, contagious, or communicable disease (Part 350.10). The state veterinarian or animal health inspector will bring questionable exhibits to the attention of the fair board.

• All animals presented that originate from a location other than New York shall meet all New York State importation regulations appropriate to the species in addition to the fair animal health requirements.

Certificates of Veterinary Inspection (CVI)

- Cattle, sheep, goats, swine, llamas, alpacas, deer, and misc. ruminants require a valid CVI to enter the fairgrounds.
- The CVI must be issued by a Category 2 accredited veterinarian. Wet ink signatures for paper CVIs or e-signature for eCVIs are acceptable.
- A physical CVI must be available to inspection staff for date and approval at time of inspection. This may be a printout of an eCVI or owner's copy of a paper CVI.
- All animals must be officially identified. **ALL MANMADE ID MUST BE RECORDED.** Refer to the Animal Identification section below for more information.
- Only one species is allowed per certificate.
- The type and duration of certificate required depends on the origin of the livestock.

New York Origin Livestock:

- A valid intrastate CVI (Al-61) is required.
- Each animal must be individually identified on the CVI (see below).
- The CVI must be issued on or after May 1 of the current year.

Out of State Origin Livestock:

- All animals entering New York State must satisfy import health and test requirements for that species and be accompanied by a valid interstate CVI.
- An e-CVI may be issued but a paper copy of the e-CVI is required for the animal check-in process.
- The interstate CVI is valid for 30 days from the date of CVI inspection. During the fair season (July 1 through Labor Day) valid CVI's can be used multiple times for entrance into fairs. The initial entrance into a NY fair must be within 30 days of the date of CVI inspection. In order for the CVI to be used for a later fair, it must be dated and initialed by a NYS Agriculture and Markets official noting the location of the initial fair. A change in health status or eligibility of an animal necessitates the generation of a new CVI.

Animal Identification

• ALL MANMADE ID MUST BE RECORDED

- Cattle must be identified by an official USDA approved ear tag. Radio frequency identification (RFID) ear tags, commonly referred to as "840 RFID tags," are strongly recommended.
- Sheep and goats must be identified by official scrapie identification (see sheep and goat sections below).
- Swine must be identified by an official USDA approved ear tag. Radio frequency identification (RFID) ear tags, commonly referred to as "840 RFID tags," are strongly recommended. Nursing piglets originating within NYS do not have to be individually identified if the sow is correctly identified on the CVI and the number of piglets in the litter is noted on the CVI. Nursing piglets from out of state will need an official ID (see swine section).
- Llamas and alpacas must be identified by official ear tag or microchip.

- Misc. ruminants must be identified by unique ear tag or microchip.
- A complete written description is sufficient identification for horses entering New York accompanied by a CVI. The description must match the EIA test record. Horse sketches and descriptions should reference color pattern, hair whorls, chestnuts, scars, and other markings as necessary to uniquely identify the horse. Tattoos and microchips if any should be included. "Bay, no markings" is not an acceptable description for a CVI or EIA test record.
- NOTE: If you are exhibiting animals identified by microchip, a working reader must be supplied by the exhibitor.
- For questions on animal identification please contact your veterinarian or our office at 518-457-3502.

Rabies Vaccination

Please note that the Washington County Fair requires Rabies Vaccinations for all Goats & Swine that are 4 months of age and older. Washington County Fair also requires that all Rabies Vaccinations be administered at least 14 days prior to arrival on the fairgrounds and not more than 365 days prior to the arrival on the fairgrounds (by August 4, 2024 as animals are entering the fairgrounds on Sunday, August 18th.)

- Rabies vaccination is required for all species for which there is a USDA licensed vaccine available (cattle, horses, sheep, dog, cat, ferret) **and** that are *4 months of age or older* on the date of admission to the fair.
 - o For most rabies vaccines, the earliest age allowable for primary vaccination is 3 months (12 weeks). Animals that are vaccinated prior to 84 days of age will need to be re-vaccinated according to label before entering the fairgrounds.
- Vaccine must have been administered within the past 12 months. The exception is Imrab LA vaccine
 used in sheep which protects for 3 years after the second annual vaccination (consult your
 veterinarian).
- The rabies vaccination requirement must be met on the day of admission even if the animal was previously admitted to a fair when too young to vaccinate.
- <u>NOTE</u>: Individual fairs can require animals for which there is no approved rabies vaccine to be vaccinated for rabies. The requirements outlined above would apply. The fair is responsible for notifying exhibitors. The <u>New York State Fair</u> requires rabies vaccination for all livestock species entering the grounds.

Acceptable Proof of Rabies Vaccination

- Acceptable proof of rabies vaccination must include a signed written statement from the veterinarian administering the vaccine or a valid certificate of veterinary inspection that has the vaccination listed and is signed by the Category 2 accredited veterinarian.
- Acceptable proof of rabies vaccination must include the name of the product used, the date of administration, and the duration of immunity if longer than one year (sheep only).
- If the statement of rabies vaccination is included on a paper EIA test record, the test record must be signed certifying vaccination in addition to the required signature for the EIA test record.
- If the statement of rabies vaccination is electronically entered into an eEIA test record, only one electronic signature is required.
- <u>NOTE</u>: Rabies titers are not acceptable proof of rabies protection and cannot be used to meet entry requirements.
- Acceptable proof of vaccination for dogs is a valid vaccination certificate or a copy of the dog license that contains the rabies vaccination information.

BVD-PI Testing

• All cattle, llamas, and alpacas exhibited at NY county fairs, or the State Fair must be negative to an approved test appropriate to detect Bovine Viral Diarrhea persistent infection (BVD-PI). Official ID must be in the animal prior to sampling. The testing veterinarian is responsible to make sure the proper test is conducted. This is a once in a lifetime test that must be reported on the required certificate of veterinary inspection. The issuing veterinarian is responsible for verifying the validity of the test, official identification of the animal, and recording the test date on the CVI. If a previous test is not verifiable, the test must be repeated.

Cleaning and Disinfection

 All buildings on the fairgrounds housing animals must be cleaned and disinfected prior to the opening of the fair and between groups of animals when housing is rotated (Section 50.2 of Agriculture and Market regulations).

Animal Deaths

Occasionally animal deaths occur at a fair. If a death occurs, it must be reported to the state
veterinarian in charge as soon as possible for review. The animal must be promptly removed from the
public exhibit area to a secure location and held for the veterinarian prior to disposal.

Calving, Kidding, and Lambing

Any cattle, goats, or sheep that calve, kid, or lamb while at a county fair or the State Fair will be
ordered removed from the fairgrounds along with their offspring, unless the animals are part of a
birthing demonstration.

Commingling of Sheep and Cattle

• Due to the potential spread of malignant catarrhal fever from sheep to cattle, it is strongly recommended that cattle be kept separate from sheep.

Commingling of Swine and Poultry

• Due to the potential spread of influenza virus, it is recommended that swine and poultry be housed in separate locations.

Isolation on Returning Home

• The owner or custodian shall keep show animals biologically separate from the herd or flock for a period of at least two weeks after returning to the premises of origin. If any illness is noted in the exhibition animals, the owner should contact their veterinarian immediately.

Individual Species Requirements

Horses

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) is <u>not</u> required for New York origin horses. CVI is required for imported horses. Extended Equine CVIs (EECVIs) are acceptable. For more information on EECVIs, visit http://www.globalvetlink.com.
- Negative Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) test is required for all horses 6 months of age or older. The
 horse must be accompanied by a valid negative EIA test record, signed by a Category 2 accredited
 veterinarian. The sample collection date for the qualifying EIA test must have been on or after January
 1, 2023, for New York origin horses. For imported horses, the EIA test must have been conducted
 within 12 months prior to entry. The EIA test certificate must include a complete description of the
 horse.
- Rabies vaccination within 12 months is required for all horses 4 months of age or older (see above).

Cattle

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals properly identified. See Animal Identification section above
- Rabies vaccination is required for all cattle 4 months of age or older (see above).
- All cattle must be negative to an approved test appropriate to detect Bovine Viral Diarrhea persistent infection (BVD-PI). The existing, official identification, date and results of the testing must be noted on the certificate of veterinary inspection.
- All cattle must be vaccinated against bovine respiratory disease complex including bovine respiratory syncytial virus, bovine virus diarrhea, infectious bovine rhinotracheitis and parainfluenza with an age appropriate- product administered in a manner and time frame adequate to confer protective immunity for these diseases for the duration of the fair. The date and vaccine product should be documented.

Sheep

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals individually identified with USDA approved scrapie identification. Identification must be one of the following: 1) USDA approved tags or 2) a legible <u>USDA approved</u> registration tattoo or 3) a legible <u>USDA approved</u> flock tattoo and individual animal ID number or 4) electronic implant device (microchip) if the sheep is enrolled in the Scrapie Flock Certification Program, and/or the electronic implant ID is recorded on the sheep's registration paper. ET tattoo in the ear or tail web. For information on scrapie ID, contact USDA at 1-866-USDA-TAG (1-866-873-2824).
- Rabies vaccination is required for all sheep 4 months of age or older (see above).
- The CVI must contain a written statement from the issuing Category 2 accredited veterinarian that the flock of origin was inspected after May 1 of the current year and no evidence of contagious, infectious, or communicable diseases was found.
- If evidence of sore mouth (contagious ecthyma) is found on any sheep, the entire exhibit including the
 affected animals (and any small ruminants from any other flock on the same conveyance to the
 fairgrounds) shall immediately be removed from the fair premises with the holding pens cleaned and
 disinfected immediately after removal.

Goats

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals individually identified with USDA approved scrapie identification. Identification must be one of the following: 1) USDA approved tags or 2) a legible <u>USDA approved</u> registration tattoo or 3) a legible <u>USDA approved</u> herd tattoo and individual animal ID number or 4) electronic implant device (microchip) if the goat is enrolled in the Scrapie Flock Certification Program and/or the electronic implant ID is recorded on the goat's registration paper. ET tattoo in the ear or tail web. For information on scrapie ID, contact USDA at 1-866-USDA-TAG (1-866-873-2824).
- The CVI must contain a written statement from the issuing Category 2 accredited veterinarian that the herd of origin was inspected after May 1 of the current year and no evidence of contagious, infectious, or communicable diseases was found.
- If evidence of sore mouth (contagious ecthyma) is found on any goat, the entire exhibit including the
 affected animals (and any small ruminants from any other flock on the same conveyance to the
 fairgrounds) shall immediately be removed from the fair premises with the holding pens cleaned and
 disinfected immediately after removal.

Swine

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals properly identified.
- Out of state nursing piglets need official identification along with the sow. See Animal Identification section above.

Llamas and Alpacas

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals properly identified. See Animal Identification section above.
- All llamas and alpacas must be negative to an approved test appropriate to detect Bovine Viral Diarrhea
 persistent infection (BVD-PI). The existing, official identification, date and results of the testing must be
 noted on the certificate of veterinary inspection.

Poultry

- Poultry (with the exception of doves, pigeons, and waterfowl) must be accompanied by 1) results of a
 negative pullorum typhoid test conducted within 90 days prior to exhibition <u>OR</u> 2) proof that the birds
 originated directly from a US pullorum-typhoid clean flock or equivalent flock.
- Poultry qualified by 90-day test must be identified by official leg band.
- Proof of NPIP status must be in the form of an NPIP certificate or purchase receipt containing NPIP certification information. If utilizing a receipt, it must be dated within 1 year of the date of admission to the fair.

Deer/Elk (Cervidae)

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals properly identified. See Animal Identification section above.
- Originate from a herd classified as accredited or qualified under USDA tuberculosis regulations.
- A movement permit obtained from the Division of Animal Industry is required for all deer movements. All CWD and TB program requirements must be met before a permit will be issued. Questions regarding movement permits should be directed to the Division of Animal Industry at 518-457-3502.

Miscellaneous Ruminants

 Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals properly identified. See Animal Identification section above.

INTERSTATE HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR FAIR ANIMALS

This document is a supplement to the Animal Health Requirements (AI-202) published for animals exhibited at New York State county fairs and the State Fair. Its purpose is to summarize the import requirements that must be met for livestock entering New York destined for fairs. Please carefully review the Animal Health Requirements. Note that individual county fairs may require rabies vaccination in species not required by the state. Contact the specific fair for their requirements. Fair contact information is available at www.nyfairs.org. Further assistance can be obtained by contacting the Division of Animal Industry (DAI) at 518-457-3502 or your State Veterinarian's office. You can also go to the following link on our Dept. website: https://agriculture.ny.gov/animals/animal-import-export

INTERSTATE Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (ICVI)

An interstate CVI is required for cattle, horses, swine, sheep, goats, llamas/alpacas, deer/elk and misc. ruminants moving interstate. Extended Equine CVIs (EECVIs) are acceptable for horses. More information on EECVIs is available at www.globalvetlink.com and from your veterinarian. Note that interstate CVI's must be issued by a Category 2 accredited veterinarian.

A printed copy of the ICVI must be presented for animal check-in. The interstate CVI is valid for 30 days from the date of CVI inspection. During the fair season, from July 1 through Labor Day, interstate CVI's can be used multiple times as long as the initial entrance to a NY fair is within 30 days of CVI inspection and the CVI is initialed by a NYS Agriculture and Markets official at the fair. Once the CVI has been initialed, it can be used for the rest of the fair season if no health issues arise. A change in health status or eligibility of an animal necessitates the generation of a new CVI. All documentation must accompany the animals. Animals not meeting the interstate and/or fair requirements will not be allowed on the grounds. Individual official ID is required on all animals. Animals with incomplete or illegible ID will be

rejected. Required rabies vaccination may be included on the health certificate.

Horses

Horses 6 months of age or older must test negative for equine infectious anemia (EIA). The sample collection date for the **qualifying EIA test must be within 12 months prior to the date of entry to the fair**. The horse must be clearly and completely identified. Rabies vaccination is required for all horses 4 months of age and older on the date of admission to a fair. Vaccination must be within the past 12 months.

Cattle

Cattle must be identified by an official USDA approved ear tag. Radio frequency identification (RFID) ear tags, commonly referred to as "840 RFID tags," are strongly recommended. Cattle from all states must test negative for BVD-PI with results and test date noted on the CVI. For cattle from the New England states, New Jersey, Ohio and Pennsylvania, no additional testing (other than the BVD-PI test) is required. For information on other states, you can contact DAI at 518-457-3971 or check the Department website at https://agriculture.ny.gov/animals/animal-import-export. Vaccination for rabies is required for all cattle 4 months of age or older on the date of admission to a fair. Vaccination must be within the past 12 months. Bovine respiratory disease complex vaccination is also required. Vaccinations must be documented.

<u>Sheep</u>

Sheep can enter with CVI. All sheep must be identified by one of the following: 1) USDA approved tags or 2) a legible <u>USDA approved</u> flock tattoo and individual animal ID number or 4) electronic implant device (microchip) if the sheep is enrolled in the Scrapie Flock Certification Program, and/or the electronic implant ID is recorded on the sheep's registration paper. ET tattoo in the ear or tail web. For information on scrapie ID, contact USDA at 1-866-USDA-TAG (1-866-873-2824). The veterinary statement certifying the flock of origin was inspected with no evidence of contagious disease in the flock at the time of inspection is required. Rabies vaccination is required for all sheep 4 months of age and older on the date of admission to a fair. Vaccination must be within the past 12 months unless a 3- year vaccination has been used. No regulatory tests are required for sheep.

Goats

Goats can enter with CVI. All goats must be identified by one of the following: 1) USDA approved tags or 2) a legible <u>USDA approved</u> registration tattoo or 3) a legible <u>USDA approved</u> herd tattoo and individual animal ID number or 4) electronic implant device (microchip) if the goat is enrolled in the Scrapie Flock Certification Program and/or the electronic implant ID is recorded on the goat's registration paper. ET tattoo in the ear or tail web. For information on scrapie ID, contact USDA at 1-866-USDA-TAG (1-866-873-2824). The veterinary statement certifying the herd of origin was inspected with no evidence of contagious disease in the herd at the time of inspection is required. *Note that individual county fairs may require rabies vaccination.* No regulatory tests are required for goats.

Swine

Swine can enter with CVI only. Swine must be identified by an official USDA approved ear tag. Radio frequency identification (RFID) ear tags, commonly referred to as "840 RFID tags," are strongly recommended. *Note that individual county fairs may require rabies vaccination.* No regulatory tests are required for swine.

Llamas / Alpacas

New world camelids attending a New York county or state fair must be accompanied by a CVI with animals individually identified by microchip or official ear tag. They must test negative for BVD-PI with test date and results noted on the CVI. Note that individual county fairs may require rabies vaccination.

Deer/Elk (Cervidae)

CWD susceptible cervid species cannot be imported into New York. Non CWD susceptible species require a permit. For information on importing deer contact DAI at 518-457-3502.

Poultry

Negative avian influenza and pullorum status is required for all poultry entering NY. Out of state poultry must be accompanied by the NPIP flock certificate if the flock is NPIP certified. Otherwise, a CVI is required. Poultry, with the exception of doves and pigeons, must test negative for pullorum within 90 days prior to importation, if not from an NPIP Pullorum-Typhoid Clean Flock. In addition, all poultry must be 1) from a source flock in which 30 birds were tested negative for avian influenza within ten days prior to entry into New York State; or 2) from an NPIP U.S. H5/H7 Avian Influenza Clean or NPIP U.S. Avian Influenza Clean Flock.



Misc. Ruminants

Certificate of veterinary inspection and official USDA approved ear tag. *Note that individual county fairs may require rabies vaccination*

In order for our new Vet Check procedure off the trailers to run smoothly and efficiently, it is imperative that you have all of your required paperwork with the truck driver and/or with you (the exhibitor) Exhibitors or Exhibitor representative(s) can follow truck to assist in identification and unloading of livestock.

Reminder for all species: WCF requires that Rabies Vaccination must be done no less than 14 days prior to arrival on the fairgrounds and no more than 365 days prior to arrival on the fairgrounds (Last Day would be August 4th as animals may arrive on Sunday August 18th)



VET CHECK OFF THE TRAILERS

NEW 2024

The co-mingling of animals from different farms presents a risk for disease exposure and the spread of infectious disease. Exposure to disease can lead to animals becoming sick itself, or taking the disease back home after the fair and exposing other animals. In order to reduce the risk of exposure and ensure the most bio-secure environment possible, the NYS Vets have made the decision that all animals entering the Washington County Fair, must first be inspected and approved for entry by a NYS Vet before they are allowed to enter a barn or wash rack.

Vet Check is when the NY State Vets and Assistants will check animals for proper identification and health information as required to match their health papers. The NYS Vets will also inspect animals for signs of disease. Animals deemed unhealthy will be sent home (READ: "State of NY Department of Ag. and Markets Part 350 - Standards for the Conduct of Fairs for specific information. This can be found on pages 18 - 28 of this Handbook). Forms must be signed by the NY State Vet or Assistant and the appropriate fair official if an animal needs to be sent home. Original Health Papers & Registration papers must be available at all times as they may be asked for by Superintendents, Fair Officials, or Judges. Health papers must be current ones approved by the State.

HERDSMANSHIP/STABLE MANAGEMENT/SHEPHERDS:

SHOWMANSHIP:

ALL YOUTH EXHIBITORS MUST SIGN UP AND SHOW IN THEIR RESPECTIVE SHOWMANSHIP CLASS. YOUTH EXHIBITORS MUST SHOW THEIR OWN ANIMAL.

Showmanship is about the person handling the animal: presenting and showing the animal to the best of the person's ability. It is about making sure the showman is looking at the judge at all times. Showmanship is really about how a person has worked and prepared their animal and the presentation of their animal to the judge.

In showmanship, the judge is evaluating how the exhibitor is working with their animal and handling theirself. Showmanship is about teamwork, an important life skill, where the youth and animal learn to work together and demonstrate their hard work for a judge.

Youth Showmanship: If a youth animal exhibitor has only one animal and the animal was sent home or was not able to come, or was rejected at the Vet Check, the Youth Show Superintendent can allow the exhibitor to show another youth's animal in showmanship (hardship case) only.

HERDSMANSHIP/STABLE MANAGEMENT/SHEPHERDS:

The Purpose of Herdsmanship/Stable Management/Shepherds is for youth exhibitors to properly care for their livestock, small animals, pens, and equipment and ensure safety and to keep the animals and the surrounding areas clean and attractive at all times during exhibition. Educational displays and public relations are also an important component of Herdsmanship/Stable Management.

Herdsmanship/Stable Management/Shepherds judging begins when the animals are entered on entry day and ends when the animals are loaded out Sunday **after 9:30 pm.** Judging will take place two times daily (times will not interfere with show times). You will look to your Barn Superintendent for specifics at your mandatory meetings that are set before Fair or Monday night of Fair.

Guidelines for Herdsmanship/Stable Management include, but are not limited to the following:

- 1. Animals are clean at all times with apparent grooming.
- 2. Animals are adequately cared for with proper feeding and watering.
- 3. Stalls/Pens are clean with the proper amount of bedding and equipment.
- 4. Tack and Feed areas are clean and neatly arranged. Forks, shovels, wheelbarrows and other equipment are hung and/or kept in a secure and safe manner.
- 5. Exhibitors share the alley areas and are required to keep it clean (raked &/or swept).
- 6. proper courtesy and conduct is shown by exhibitors at all times and places.
- 7. All exhibitors are expected to participate in Herdsmanship/Stable Management.

RULES & REGULATIONS FOR OPEN GYMKHANA EXHIBITORS & SHOW

- 1. Entries to the Washington County Fair OPEN GYMKHANA are open to residents and non-residents of Washington County.
- 2. Any ADULT (18 yrs old & over) riding an exhibited horse on the fairgrounds and in horse areas are strongly encouraged to wear a properly fitted, USPC (Pony Club) or ASTM/FEI approved safety riding helmet.
- 3. YOUTH Riders (17 yrs old & Under) are REQUIRED to wear a properly fitted, USPC (Pony Club) or ASTM/FEI approved safety riding helmet.
- 4. NO slip on spurs are allowed.
- 5. Gymkhana classes REQUIRE western saddles and attire (jeans, button down shirt, heeled boots, etc).
- 6. Riders need to know how to ride on their own. There are no lead line classes.
- 7. 5 Second penalties will be given for knocking down one barrel, pole, stake, or any piece of equipment. Knocking down more than one barrel, pole, stake, etc. will result in a disqualification. It is permissible to support or steady an obstacle with hands or feet during the course of a run.
- 8. Disqualifications include:
 - a) A deviation from the event pattern (Except for the PEE WEE Class) (ex: retracing your path to correct the pattern, circling back to retrieve a missed object, etc)
 - b) A fall off the horse any time while the timer is running.
 - c) Cruelty to the horse or unsportsmanlike behavior. The Show Superintendent's decision is final.
 - d) The horse is out of control or unmanageable.
 - e) Failure to have a proper helmet on, or helmet that is not properly buckled upon entering the arena.
 - f) Use of prohibited items of tack or equipment.

- 9. Riders may enter arena mounted or lead horses into designated start areas.
- 10. Riders may exit the arena mounted provided their horse has come to a complete stop & is under complete control.
- 11. In the event of a tie for Champion & Reserve Standings, the tie will be broken based on the ARIZONA KEYHOLE Race result.
- 12. No horse can be ridden more than once in a class.
- 13. In the event of an electronic timer malfunction, riders will be offered a re-ride either immediately after their run, or at the end of the class.
- 14. No cell phone usage when mounted on a horse.

ALL HORSES MUST BE KEPT AT A WALK WHEN ENTERING and EXITING THE ARENA.

NO CELL PHONE USAGE IS ALLOWED WHILE MOUNTED ON A HORSE.

Check which will take place off the trailers this year. Rules & A Dairy & Beef Cattle Exhibitor Information Sheet will also be included in your Exhibitor Envelope. Please read it and be familiar with the information. Regulations Exhibitors are responsible for keeping their animals under control, regardless of who handles them. Exhibitors of herds or a representative must be present at all times. Exhibitor harnesses are required to be used during the shows. Only 1 exhibitor is allowed in the ring with an animal with the exception of group classes. All animals MUST BE entered & shown in single classes in order to compete in group classes. Post entries will be allowed for Group Classes only. If you wish to POST ENTER a Group Class it must be done at Check -In and the fee is to be paid at that time. The person/farm making the entry will receive the premium. Exhibitors are to follow designated Animal Paths when moving animals to & from barns, wash racks, & show arenas. You must supply your own water tubs. 10. Superintendents try to honor all stall requests in placing animals; however, due to space limitations exhibitors may not get their requested place. 11. External application of cosmetics that affect the appearance of the animal may be used AFTER Health/Vet Check-In. 12. For any animal that needs to leave the Fairgrounds before the conclusion of the Fair, the Exhibitor MUST inform the Superintendent who then needs to inform the Entry Office who will then contact the State Vet who is required to evaluate the animal before it leaves the grounds. Then the Superintendent & State Vet MUST complete the appropriate paperwork before the animal leaves (as per NYS Ag & Markets) and file it in the Entry Office. For all cattle exhibitors wishing to attend NY State Fair, you MUST notify your Supt. on or before 5:00pm Monday Opening Day of Fair and follow the above protocol. **YOUTH Show** 1. There is a Limit of 10 animals per exhibitor. 2. All Youth must show their own animals. In the case of two entries in a class or group classes, the exhibitor Rules & shall choose another youth to show the other animal and must wear the exhibitor's number. The youth chosen Regulations must meet the age requirements and follow the designated dress code. Only one (1) exhibitor is allowed in the ring with an animal with the exception of group classes. ALL YOUTH MUST ENTER & PARTICIPATE IN SHOWMANSHIP & SHOW THEIR OWN ANIMAL IN ORDER TO BE ELIGIBLE TO SHOW IN BREED CLASSES & RECEIVE PREMIUMS. DRESS CODE FOR ALL DAIRY CLASSES: long white pants & white sleeved shirts tucked in are required for all classes. Farm names, letters, or logos are not permitted on show attire. No hats are allowed. Consequence for not following stated dress code in Dairy & Beef will be the dropping of ONE AWARD (i.e. Blue to Red, Red to White, White to NO award). Violators must correct their wardrobe before re-entering the show ring. If an animal is leased, the open department entry must be made in the owner's name, residency rules apply. If an animal becomes unmanageable for any reason, the Superintendent has the right to excuse the animal from the class. If an animal is excused for safety reasons, the exhibitor will be awarded the "worthy" (white) place value. All exhibitors in the Youth Barn will be entered in the Herdsmanship Contest. Flagrant violators will receive warnings & persistent violators will be sent home with no premiums paid. Dual ownership or syndicates are NOT allowed. 10. Superintendents are NOT responsible for the exhibitors' behavior. Parents are responsible for providing supervision throughout Fair week. 11. Youth Exhibitors of cattle who have earned a BLUE RIBBON may enter the OPEN Show by PAYING ENTRY FEE on the day of the Youth Show by 7pm Wednesday night with the exception of those youth who are leasing cattle. The Washington County Fair follows the IAFE Code of Ethics which is included in the beginning of this Handbook. **Show Ring** Exhibitors are to be courteous to others in the show ring. **Etiquette** 3. Exhibitors should watch and listen to directions from the judge and ring steward. Exhibitors should display good sportsmanship (Spectators do not always understand the placing, but they do 4. recognize good and poor sportsmanship). Exhibitors should be at the ring in a timely manner. For the YOUTH Show, Ring Attendants and Ring Stewards will be there to provide assistance if needed and will

be appointed by the Show Superintendent.

Animal Care during the Week of Fair	 Exhibitors are responsible for keeping their animals under control, regardless of who handles them. An attendant must be with cattle at all times during the day. Night security will patrol and check the barns at night. Animal disclosure Agreement is included on your Entry Form. Please read carefully. The exhibitor is responsible for feed, forage, and bedding throughout the week of the fair. Exhibitors must bring their own water tub/buckets for their animals.
Display of Animals	 Farm Identification, family name and location should be visible for the public. Exhibitors will participate in Herdsmanship as follows: YOUTH - All youth exhibitors in the Youth Dairy Barn and the Youth Livestock Barn will automatically be entered in this contest. The judging will take place during the week, every day 2 or 3 times a day beginning on Tuesday. Judging will occur between 9 am and 9 pm. Daily results will be posted in respective barns. (please note that this is not the parents' responsibility) OPEN - Each exhibitor will receive a packet on Monday, opening day of the fair.
Wash Rack Courtesy	 The Washington County Fair provides the wash rack facility for animal exhibitors. Please be respectful of the equipment. The power nozzles and hoses are expensive and are only to be used for washing animals. Please scrape out any manure made by your animal by pushing it into the grates at the end. Scrapers are located in the wash rack area. Please leave them there for all to use. Clean up your equipment when finished - soap, bottles, brushes, etc. Deposit empty bottles and other garbage in garbage cans that are provided. Do not save spots at the wash rack. Be courteous to fellow exhibitors. Please give preference to animals on their show days (refer to the show schedule below). Please notify the Fair Office if wash rack equipment is not working properly. Equipment can only get fixed if it is reported.
Milking Parlor	 Hours of operation of the Milking Parlor will be posted on the AG. CENTER Bulletin Board. Preference should be given to animals on their respective show day (refer to the schedule below). BEFORE entering the Parlor, remove all teat sealants and give any injections - both of these procedures invoke too many questions from the public. Please notify the Milking Parlor Attendant if you have any animals that are treated with Antibiotics or have to be treated during the week. ALL TREATED or problems cows will be milked last.
Cattle & Livestock Paths	 NO livestock are to be on the midway, near food concessions, or in any public area not designated for animals. Animals must be in their appropriate exhibit building, show rings, wash areas, milking parlor, or taking part in their respective event or activity. Public Health and Biosecurity concerns prohibit animals from being taken around the Fairgrounds. Please follow the designated paths when moving animals to and from barns, show rings, wash areas, and the milking parlor. Please see the map in your Exhibitor Envelope. These paths have been designated for the safety of the public and the overall appearance (cleanliness) of our fairgrounds. All exhibitors should assist in keeping these paths as clean as possible by cleaning up after their animals.

*Exhibitors are to bring their original Registration Papers which will be checked to verify ownership, breeder, birthdates, and to check for any entry issues by the show supt or a committee appointed by the show supt.

*At Check-In, Exhibitors will bring their Exhibitor Entry List Report with their scratches already done and will confirm their scratches on the Entry Office copy and if class adjustments need to be made (after checking registration papers) they will be done at this time as well as post entries of Group Classes (which will be paid for at this time as well). The person/farm making the entry will receive the premium. Once complete the exhibitor will sign off stating the entries and scratches are accurate. The scratches will not appear in the Judge's Book or Show Program.

- 10. Youth Exhibitors of cattle who have earned a BLUE RIBBON may enter the OPEN Show by paying the entry fee on the day of the Youth Show by 7pm Thursday night with the exception of those youth who are leasing cattle.

Show Ring Etiquette

- The Washington County Fair follows the IAFE Code of Ethics which is included in the beginning of this Handbook.
- 2. Exhibitors are to be courteous to others in the show ring.
- 3. Exhibitors should watch and listen to directions from the judge and ring steward.
- 4. Exhibitors should display good sportsmanship (Spectators do not always understand the placing, but they do recognize good and poor sportsmanship).
- 5. Exhibitors should be at the ring in a timely manner.
- 6. For the YOUTH Show, Ring Attendants and Ring Stewards will be there to provide assistance if needed and will be appointed by the Show Superintendent.

Animal Care during the Week of Fair

- 1. Exhibitors are responsible for keeping their animals under control, regardless of who handles them.
- 2. An attendant must be with cattle at all times during the day. Night security will patrol and check the barns at night.
- 3. Animal disclosure Agreement is included on your Entry Form. Please read carefully & sign.
- 4. The exhibitor is responsible for feed, forage, and bedding throughout the week of the fair.
- 5. You must provide your own water tub.

Display of Animals

- 1. Farm Identification, family name and location should be visible for the public.
- 2. Exhibitors will participate in **Herdsmanship** as follows:

YOUTH - All youth exhibitors in the Youth Dairy Barn and the Youth Livestock Barn will automatically be entered in this contest. The judging will take [place during the week, every day 2 or 3 times a day beginning on Tuesday. Judging will occur between 9am and 9 pm. Daily results will be posted in respective barns. (please note that this is not the parents' responsibility)

OPEN - Each exhibitor will receive a packet on Monday, opening day of the fair.

Wash Rack Courtesy

The Washington County Fair provides this facility for animal exhibitors.

- 1. Please be respectful of the equipment. The power nozzles and hoses are expensive and are only to be used for washing animals.
- 2. Please scrape out any manure made by your animal by pushing it into the grates at the end. Scrapers are located in the wash rack area. Please leave them there for all to use.
- Clean up your equipment when finished soap, bottles, brushes, etc. Deposit empty bottles and other garbage in garbage pails.
- 4. Do not save spots at the wash rack.
- 5. Be courteous to fellow exhibitors.
- 6. Please give preference to animals on their show days (refer to the show schedule).
- 7. Please notify the Fair Office if wash rack equipment is not working properly. Equipment can only get fixed if it is reported.

Cattle/Livestock Paths

- NO livestock are to be on the midway, near food concessions, or in any public area not designated for animals. Animals must be in their appropriate exhibit building, show rings, wash areas, milking parlor, or taking part in their respective event or activity. Public Health and Biosecurity concerns prohibit animals from being taken around the Fairgrounds.
- 2. Please follow the designated paths when moving animals to and from barns, show rings, wash areas, and the milking parlor. Please see the map in your Exhibitor Envelope.
- These paths have been designated for the safety of the public and the overall appearance (cleanliness) of our fairgrounds.
- 4. All exhibitors should assist in keeping these paths as clean as possible by cleaning up after their animals.

- 1. Exhibitors are responsible for keeping their animals under control, regardless of who handles them.
- 2. Exhibitors of herds or a representative must be present at all times
- **3.** All Youth livestock entries must be owned by JUNE 15th of the current year.
- **4.** All Open livestock entries must be owned by JULY 15th of the current year.
- **5.** All sheep must be registered with the approved breed registrar except for Grade Sections. Exhibitors showing grade sheep are to follow the directions in the Grade Sections.
- **6.** All ages of animals will be determined as of September 1st.
- 7. In the 2yr old & older (aged Ewe) classes, NO EWE which has not raised a lamb is eligible to be shown.
- 8. All lambs entered must be under 1 year of age and at least 3 months of age by opening day of Fair.
- All rams 1 year old or older may leave the fairgrounds Thursday after shows at the discretion of the Superintendent. The entry office should be notified and release papers filed.
- **10.** Show halters are optional.
- 11. All animals must be entered & shown in individual classes in order to compete in group classes.
- 12. The Superintendent may divide classes for judging as he/she desires.
- 13. All livestock exhibitors wishing to remove a part of their exhibit in order to show at the NY State Fair MUST NOTIFY the Superintendent on or before 5:00 pm Monday Opening Day. The Superintendent MUST complete the appropriate form from the Entry Office, sign off on the animal(s).
- 14. For any animal that needs to leave the Fairgrounds before the conclusion of the Fair, the exhibitor MUST inform the Superintendent who then needs to inform the Entry Office. The State Vet is required to evaluate the animal before it leaves the grounds and complete the appropriate paperwork and file it in the Entry Office before the animal leaves the premises as per Ag & Markets regulations.

RULES & REGULATIONS FOR YOUTH EXHIBITORS & SHOW

- 1. For youth there is a Limit of 10 animals per exhibitor.
- 2. For Youth there is a Limit of 2 animals per class per exhibitor.
- 3. For all youth livestock the animals must be registered in the Youth Exhibitor's Name, Not the farm name. The exception is the Leased Animal Program (Non-Owned Animal Program).
- 4. All Youth must show their own animals. In the case of two entries in a class or group classes, the Exhibitor shall choose another youth to show the other animals and must wear the exhibitor's number. The youth chosen must meet the age requirements and follow the designated dress code.
- 5. All youth must ENTER & SHOW in SHOWMANSHIP to be eligible to show in BREED classes & receive premiums.
- 6. If an animal is leased, the open department entry must be made in the owner's name and residency rules apply.
- 7. If an animal becomes unmanageable for any reason, the Superintendent has the right to excuse the animal from the class. If an animal is excused for safety reasons, the exhibitor will be awarded the "worthy" (white) place value.
- 8. Superintendents are NOT responsible for the exhibitor's behavior. Parents & Clubs should arrange for chaperones throughout the week.

- 1. Exhibitors are responsible for keeping their animals under control, regardless of who handles them.
- 2. Exhibitors of herds or a representative must be present at all times.
- 3. Ownership of all YOUTH livestock must be by the date of JUNE 15th of the current year.
- 4. Ownership of all OPEN livestock must be by the date of JULY 15th of the current year.
- 5. All goats must be registered with the approved breed registry and Recorded Dairy Goats are recognized by ADGA and should have registration papers. MEAT Goats that are not registered are to be entered in the SECTION: COMMERCIAL/GRADE. Reminder: a readable copy of the registration papers are to be sent in with the entry forms.
- 6. NO Bucks are allowed.
- 7. Dairy Goats must NOT have horns. Fiber or Meat Goats may have horns, but must have protection. Contact the Open or Youth Superintendents prior to bringing animals if you have questions.
- 8. No animals may be displayed, or entered, who are under 3 months of age by opening day of Fair.
- 9. No animal will be housed if not entered in a class.
- 10. Goats are to remain in pens or in areas designated by Superintendents.
- 11. Pens are to be cleaned by 9:30 am daily.
- 12. ADGA Rules will apply unless otherwise stated.
- 13. Only those exhibitors 5 yrs. of age (by Dec. 1st of the current year) and older may be in the show ring.
- 14. Dairy & Meat Goats are to be shown with a halter or collar, exhibitor's choice.
- 15. Only 1 exhibitor is allowed in the ring with an animal with the exception of group classes.
- 16. Exhibitors of Cashmere Goats are required to bring a sample of the animal's combings from the current year.
- 17. All animals must be entered & shown in individual classes in order to compete in group classes.
- 18. Superintendent may divide classes for judging as he/she desires.
- 19. All livestock exhibitors wishing to remove a part of their exhibit in order to show at the NY State Fair MUST NOTIFY the Superintendent on or before 5:00 pm Monday Opening Day. The Superintendent MUST complete the appropriate form from the Entry Office, sign off on the animal(s).
- 20. For any animal that needs to leave the Fairgrounds before the conclusion of the Fair, the exhibitor MUST inform the Superintendent who then needs to inform the Entry Office. The State Vet is required to evaluate the animal before it leaves the grounds and complete the appropriate paperwork and file it in the Entry Office before the animal leaves the premises as per Ag & Markets regulations.

- 10. If an animal is leased, the open department entry must be made in the owner's name and residency rules apply.
- 11. The Judge or Superintendent may dismiss any exhibitor from the show ring, if in their opinion, the goat is unmanageable, lame or the exhibitor displays poor sportsmanship.

 - *Goats should lead readily & respond quickly. You should work with your pack goat using the lead as you would on a trail, but you may hold the collar or halter if necessary for certain maneuvers.
 - *Exhibitors should walk at a normal pace, not allowing the goat to get ahead or out of Control. No dragging of animals will be permitted.
 - *The goat should be calm and respond quickly to your requests for maneuvers.
 - *Poise, alertness and courteous attitude are all desired at all times.

QUESTIONS

The exhibitor will be asked five questions concerning pack goats and hiking.

PACK GOAT TRAIL TEST

- Appropriately fitted goat packs containing 10% weight or less for a goat under one year of age, and at least 10% and not more than 20% of the goat's weight for a goat over one year of age.
 - **It is encouraged to have a pack on the goat but not necessary.** You will be asked the weight of your animals and the weight of the pack it can carry for its age and weight.
- Lead Equipment should consist of a working collar or halter.
- The TEN essentials of Hiking will be carried on the person in a fanny pack, backpack or vest.
 - **It is encouraged to carry them but not necessary. However, you do need to know all of them and will be asked to list them if you cannot show them**

THE TRAIL TEST

The test shall consist of 10 obstacles. Each obstacle is worth 3 Points

All exhibits will be housed in their respective Youth Areas. Entries that are strictly a Youth Entry will be placed in the Youth Building and Barns. For Youth Livestock (cattle, beef, goats, sheep, and swine) youth entries earning a blue ribbon may enter their respective Open Show by signing up for and paying the entry fee by 7:00 pm on the day of their Youth Show in the Entry Office (exception - those that are leasing animals).
Judging Of Youth Non- Animal Exhibits	 Judging takes place from 9:00 am through 3:00 pm on Saturday before the Fair in the Youth Building. August 17th. Exhibits will be judged on a basis of the Danish System: EXCELLENT (Blue); GOOD (Red); WORTHY (White) All Youth are to bring their exhibits to the Judge for Face-to-Face evaluation. Only those receiving "worthy" or better will receive an award.

Arrival of Exhibits

- 1. Exhibits in the Youth Building (Non-Animal/Static) must arrive between 9:00 am 3:00 pm Saturday (August 17th) before the Fair for Check-In at the Picnic Pavilion.
- 2. Livestock Exhibitors should read about the Arrival Times in their respective departments. If you have questions concerning arrival, please contact the Superintendent of the department. All animals are to be in place by 5:00 pm Monday night.

Livestock & Livestock Exhibitors Information

- 1. NO livestock are to be on the midway, near food concessions, or in any public area not designated for animals. Animals must be in their appropriate exhibit building, show ring, wash area, milking parlor, or taking part in their respective event or activity. Public Health and Biosecurity concerns prohibit animals from being taken around the Fairgrounds.
- 2. No feed or bedding of any description will be furnished for animals (except for Poultry, Rabbits Barns and The FFA Barn which will receive feed and bedding).
- 3. All registered livestock must be personally owned and registered in the name of the youth exhibitor as well as cared for by the youth exhibitor.
- 4. DUAL OWNERSHIP & SYNDICATES ARE NOT ALLOWED.
- 5. All Youth Exhibitors that have NON-OWNED (LEASED) Animals must have filed their appropriate paperwork to the Cooperative Extension Office before 4:30 pm on MAY 31st.
- 6. All cattle and swine must be identified by an official USDA approved eartag. See cattle and swine department information.
- 7. Youth Exhibitors must show their own animals. In the case of two(2) entries in a class or group class, the exhibitor shall choose another youth (under 19 yrs. old) to show the other animal (using the exhibitor's show #) and must notify the Superintendent prior to the show.
- 8. SHOWMANSHIP is MANDATORY for all livestock including, Beef, Dairy, Goats, Horses, Poultry, Rabbits, Sheep, and Swine. Each exhibitor will show their own animal. If the exhibitor has only 1 animal and it is sent home (for health reasons) the Superintendent can allow the exhibitor to show another youth's animal in showmanship only (Hardship Case). The animal used for showmanship must be entered in its regular class. Premiums, ribbons, and prizes will be forfeited if the exhibitor does not participate in showmanship.
- 9. NO youth are permitted to sleep in a Youth Building or Barn.

Leasing of an Animal

- Youth not owning an animal may participate in the Non-Owned (Leased) Animal Project which is
 designed to allow youth to experience the "4-H Animal Project". Therefore, the 4-H Animal
 Project is NOT available to youth owning an animal of that species.
- Youth must meet all the regulations for the species and in addition a certificate (available at the 4-H Cooperative Extension Office) must be filled out and have all the proper signatures by 4:30 MAY 31st.
- 3. Youth are limited to leasing and showing TWO (2) non-owned animals per species.
- 4. All deadlines and Health Requirements are the same for the Youth leasing animals.
